





As part of the process to develop Peel Energy's 19 turbine, 50MW renewable energy installation at Frodsham marshes, Frodsham Wind Farm Ltd voluntarily committed to provide an annual Community Benefit Fund of £120,000 a year to be used for local projects that benefit villages in the area.

The fund, officially named the Marshes Community Benefit Fund (MCBF) by the local panel administering it, will receive £3 million over the operational life of the wind farm. This will provide an excellent resource for projects delivering benefits for the local community, primarily around Frodsham, Helsby and Elton.

Panel representatives were selected on the basis of having significant local ties, knowledge of the area and professional skills. Cheshire Community Action independently assessed individual members to ensure that the panel has a well-balanced composition, and each member is contributing their time and skills for free. The majority of panel members were either born in the area or have lived locally for over 20 years meaning that collectively, they have extensive local knowledge of how funds can bring the most benefit to the community.

Volunteers visiting nest boxes in the hedgerows east of Turbine 13 were pleasantly surprised to find that both of the new boxes were occupied, one by Kestrels with two well-grown chicks, and the other with a brood of three Barn Owls, almost ready to fly.
